The speed limit is changing!

The go-ahead has been given to lower the speed limit through Froxfield.

No objections were made to Froxfield Parish Council's request to lower the speed limit at the eastern end of the village. Therefore, Wiltshire Council has given the official thumbs up to extend the 40mph limit to cover the entire village, between the white gates.

The change particularly focuses on the length of road from the Berkshire boundary to just short of The College — previously a 50mph zone — which will now be slowed to 40mph, and creates a standard speed limit through Froxfield. The move follows the mandatory 28-day public notice period, and Wiltshire Council planners received no objections to the proposal.

This is the culmination of years of work by local parish councillors who attended numerous meetings of the WCC local highways improvement group and consulted with Wiltshire Highways engineers, and are grateful for the valuable support of our Wiltshire County Councillor Stuart Wheeler.

Meanwhile, the parish council will continue to look at traffic calming measures.

It has arranged to install a Speed Indicator Device (SID) to reinforce the 'slow down' message to motorists as well as the change of speed limit. A contractor commissioned by WCC Highways will carry out the necessary work, including new speed limit signage, which should be complete before the end of June. The SID will be installed at the same time.

The CPRE stresses that the contest is not for the 'prettiest village' but rather seeks a well maintained and cared-for communal spaces and evidence of community spirit in action.

The Froxfield Parish Council has filled in the entry forms, but now it is up to the residents to do their bit to make our village shine against the competition of other medium-sized villages across this part of Wiltshire. If we come out on top, we are then pitted against similar villages across the county! Although we feel small, in fact Froxfield's official population of 377 people just edges into the 'medium' sized village category. The whole county is divided into four districts and winners in each category then compete against each other in July, when they are judged by another pair of judges to find the overall winners in each of the categories.
